Cassie Bladow is President & CEO of the U.S. Beet Sugar Association. She works to advance the unified objectives of America's sugarbeet cooperatives. She previously served the association as director of government affairs, then vice president. She currently serves as Chair of the industry-wide American Sugar Alliance.

Cassie has served as an advocate for agriculture throughout her career. Prior to rejoining the U.S. Beet Sugar Association, she served as chief of staff for Senator John Hoeven. Through various roles on Senator Hoeven's staff, she worked to represent the interests of constituents in North Dakota. She played a crucial role in developing policy for farmers and ranchers through two Farm Bills and Senator Hoeven's role on the Senate Agriculture Appropriations Subcommittee.

Cassie resides in northern Virginia with her husband, Shaun, and son, Theodore. She grew up on a sugarbeet farm in northwestern Minnesota, which her family still operates. She graduated from North Dakota State University.

Kevin Price is vice president of government affairs for American Crystal Sugar Company. Since 1996, Kevin has been the primary liaison between American Crystal and the federal government, and he advises the Company on all matters of federal policy. Kevin also manages American Crystal Sugar's political action committee which is the largest PAC in U.S. agriculture. Kevin is a long-time member of USDA's Agricultural Trade Advisory Committee on Sweeteners, is former president of the New York Sugar Club, and is active in the American Sugar Alliance, the U.S. Beet Sugar Association, and the National Council of Farmer Cooperatives. Raised on a family dairy farm in eastern Michigan and grew sugarbeets for 9 years as a 4-H project. His grandparents and parents raised sugarbeets beginning in 1933.

Executive Vice President of the Farmers and Manufacturers Beet Sugar Association in Saginaw, Michigan 1979-1982, representing all sugarbeet growers in Michigan and Ohio. Executive Vice President of the American Sugarbeet Growers Association in Washington, DC since 1982, representing all sugarbeet growers in 11 states.

Directly involved in the formulation and passage of the sugar provisions of the last eight farm bills (1981, 1985, 1990, 1996, 2002, 2008, 2014 and 2018).

Advisor to USDA and USTR for international trade negotiations, beginning with the International Sugar Agreement in Geneva in 1982; the North American Free Trade Agreement; the Uruguay Round of the GATT; the Doha Round of the WTO, and pending and ongoing regional and bilateral free trade agreements. Served six years on the USDA Agricultural Technical Advisory Committee (ATAC) for Sweeteners, then served on the Agricultural Policy Advisory Committee as an advisor to Secretaries Ann Veneman and Mike Johanns and USTR Ambassador Zoellick. He was reappointed to the ATAC for Sweeteners in 2015 by USDA Secretary Tom Vilsack and USTR Michael Froman and currently serves on the committee. He was involved in the antidumping and countervailing cases against Mexico and the negotiated suspension agreements between the two countries.

Served eight terms as Chairman of the industry-wide American Sugar Alliance (1989/90, 1994/95, 2000/01, 2004/05, 2011/2012, 2015/16, 2017/18, 2021/22).

Served as Co-Chairman of the Sugar Industry Biotechnology Council since 2003 (20 years) leading the first successful introduction of sugar produced from genetically engineered sugarbeets or sugar cane in the world. 2017 recipient of the prestigious Savitsky Award for his leadership in introduction, adoption and defense of biotechnology in the beet sugar industry. The Savitsky award is the highest award given by the American Society of Sugar Beet Technologists.

Served as President of the New York "Sugar Club," 2005/2006.

David Wasserman

Senior Editor and Elections Analyst, the Cook Political Report Political Analyst for NBC News

David Wasserman is Senior Editor & Elections Analyst for The Cook Political Report with Amy Walter, where he is responsible for analyzing U.S. House races and is recognized as one of the nation's top nonpartisan election forecasters. The Los Angeles Times has called David a "whip smart" and "scrupulously nonpartisan" analyst whose "numbers nerd-dom was foretold at a young age." In 2016, David drew praise for his accurate pre-election analysis, including his piece "How Trump Could Win the White House While Losing the Popular Vote," written two months before election day. In 2020, his forecast of Biden's win was correct in 49 of 50 states, missing only North Carolina. David has served as an analyst for the NBC News Election Night Decision Desk since 2008, and has also appeared on Fox News, CNN, C-SPAN and NPR. In May of 2024, David was awarded a Carnegie Fellowship to study ways to combat political polarization.

Rob Johansson, PhD

Dr. Rob Johansson serves as the Director of Economics and Policy Analysis for the American Sugar Alliance, the national coalition of sugarbeet and sugarcane growers, processors, and refiners. There he analyzes sugar supply and demand fundamentals as well as domestic and foreign sugar and general agricultural policies, including Farm Bill topics and international trade negotiations. Dr. Johansson currently serves as the Chairman of USDA's Agricultural Technical Advisory Committee for Trade in Sweeteners and Sweetener Products. He also serves as Vice-president of the The Sugar Club.

Previously, Dr. Johansson was the Chief Economist for the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Dr. Johansson served in that role from January 2015 to January 2021. As Chief Economist, he was responsible for the Department's agricultural forecasts and for advising the Secretary of Agriculture on programs, regulations, and legislative proposals. During that period, Dr. Johansson was the Chairman of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation Board of Directors and also was responsible for setting up the Farm Production and Conservation (or FPAC) mission area in 2017 – combining NRCS, RMA, and FSA.

Dr. Johansson has held positions at the Office of Management and Budget, the Congressional Budget Office, and the White House Council of Economic Advisers. He received his B.A. in economics from Northwestern University and then served with the U.S. Peace Corps from 1990 to 1995. After returning to his home State of Minnesota in 1995, he received his Ph.D. in Agricultural & Applied Economics from the University of Minnesota in 2000.

Trevino was Deputy Secretary at the California Department of Food and Agriculture for two governors overseeing international export and trade programs.

Ms. Nesci joined USDA in January 2022 and brings over 25 years of experience in pesticide regulation to OPMP. Prior to her current position, Ms. Nesci most recently served as the Director of the Biological and Economic Analysis Division in EPA's Office of Pesticide Programs (OPP), where she oversaw the development of biological and economic impact analyses on the usage and benefits of pesticides to support the Federal regulatory process. During her time in OPP, Ms. Nesci led a number of high-profile policy, science, and regulatory initiatives and held multiple management positions, including Deputy Director of the Environmental Fate and Effects Division and Chief of the Microbial Pesticides Branch in the Biopesticides and Pollution Prevention Division. Prior to her career in the government, Ms. Nesci worked at a pesticide consulting firm.

Ms. Nesci earned a Bachelor's degree in Environmental Science from the University of Mary Washington and a Master's degree in Entomology from the University of Maryland, where she worked on tarnished plant bug in lima beans on the Eastern Shore and potatoes genetically engineered for resistance to the Colorado potato beetle.

He is experienced in devising strategies for using trade law procedures, such as the antidumping laws, to achieve business objectives and in resolving disputes between companies and the U.S. government arising from sanctions, export controls and customs laws.

Mr. Cassidy served as General Counsel of the Office of the U.S. Trade Representative from 1979-1981 and International Trade Counsel to the U.S. Senate Committee on Finance from 1975-1979. As General Counsel of USTR, Mr. Cassidy was the senior legal officer of the U.S. government responsible for issues arising under the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade. He oversaw U.S. implementation of the agreements reached in the Tokyo Round of Multinational Trade Negotiations and was the lead U.S. negotiator with Japan on market access issues, including procurement by Nippon Telegraph & Telephone Corporation. As International Trade Counsel to the Finance Committee, Mr. Cassidy was a creator of the procedures for consideration of legislation implementing trade agreements — procedures known today as the "fast track" or "trade promotion authority" procedures. He was also a primary architect of the modern antidumping and countervailing duty statutes enacted in the Trade Agreements Act of 1979.

Mr. Cassidy was a partner at WilmerHale until 2007, where he was leader of the firm's International Practice Group and the Trade Group. Mr. Cassidy established Cassidy Levy Kent (USA) LLP in early 2009.

Ryan M. Majerus

Performing the non-exclusive functions and duties of Assistant Secretary, Enforcement and Compliance, International Trade Administration
U.S. Department of Commerce

Ryan Majerus is performing the non-exclusive duties of the Assistant Secretary for Enforcement and Compliance at the International Trade Administration. In this role, he leads the federal government's efforts to support economic growth by maintaining a fair and rules-based system of international trade. This includes enforcing U.S. antidumping and countervailing duty laws and holding trading partners accountable for their obligations under trade agreements.

Most recently, Majerus served as Senior Policy Advisor for Supply Chains at the White House National Economic Council. He also served as ITA's Deputy Assistant Secretary for Trade Policy and Negotiations, where he oversaw the formulation and implementation of policies governing U.S. trade remedy laws and subsidies enforcement statues.

Prior to joining the Biden-Harris Administration, Majerus had a decade-long legal career in the federal government. This included service as Senior Counsel at the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), where he helped lead the agency's nationwide advocacy efforts in appeals before the U.S. Supreme Court and every U.S. Court of Appeals, working with Department of Justice attorneys in the Office of the Solicitor General and the Civil Appellate Staff. Prior to USDA, Ryan spent nearly four years at the Office of the U.S. Trade Representative (USTR) as an Assistant General Counsel, where he litigated several disputes before the World Trade Organization involving U.S. trade remedies and government subsidies and advised on numerous policy portfolios, including agriculture. He also served for five years with the Civil Division of the Department of Justice, where he represented Commerce as lead counsel in numerous trade remedies cases before the U.S. Court of International Trade and the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Federal Circuit. He also clerked for the Chief Judge of the U.S. District Court of the Western District of Tennessee.

Ryan was born and raised in Billings, MT. He received his Bachelor of Arts in government from Georgetown University and his juris doctorate from Georgetown University Law Center. Ryan lives in Falls Church, VA, with his wife Samantha and daughter Juliette.

Title and Responsibilities: Barb has advised USDA top leadership on managing sugar supplies since 2002 including: the 1-month period in 2005 when Hurricanes Katrina, Rita and Wilma hit cane country, the Savannah refinery explosion in 2008; the massive undertaking to dispose of surplus sugar in 2013; advising Commerce in the preparation of the Suspension Agreement in 2014 and its revisions in 2017; how to react to Vermont's 2016 requirement to label all GM goods entering the state; the major beet losses in 2019 and the high world prices to date. While she has been trusted to provide sound advice, she is not the ultimate decision-maker.

She also oversees other senior economists responsible for the domestic sugar, dairy, livestock, cotton, peanuts, grains and oilseeds programs and provides guidance to the Secretary of Agriculture in the formulation and implementation of national policies and procedures, as well as economic and budgetary impact analysis of those programs.

Randy Green

Principal, Watson Green LLC Consultant, Sweetener Users Association

Randy Green, the owner of Watson Green LLC, has seen food and agriculture policy from all sides, having served in both the executive and legislative branches of government and in the private sector. Over his career he has been closely involved in the development of several multi-year farm bills, as well as major legislation and regulations affecting derivatives, food safety, animal health and human nutrition.

Randy came to Washington in the 1980s to work for former Representative Charles Stenholm (D-TX) and later served the late Senator Richard Lugar (R-IN.) on the staff of the Senate Agriculture Committee. With the exception of a stint as a deputy under secretary of agriculture, Randy served on the agriculture committee staff continuously from 1989 to 1999. The last two years he was chief of staff.

In 1999, Randy entered the private sector to represent agricultural and food industry clients at the firm now known as Watkinson Miller. Earlier in his career, he managed government relations for the American Soybean Association and was director of the Wheat Export Trade Education Center.

In 2013, Randy and Lisa Watson formed Watson Green LLC, a firm centered on food and agriculture policy and public affairs. With Lisa's retirement at the end of 2022, Randy continues to operate the company.

Ryan joined the Florida, Texas and Hawaii Sugarcane Growers in 2006.
