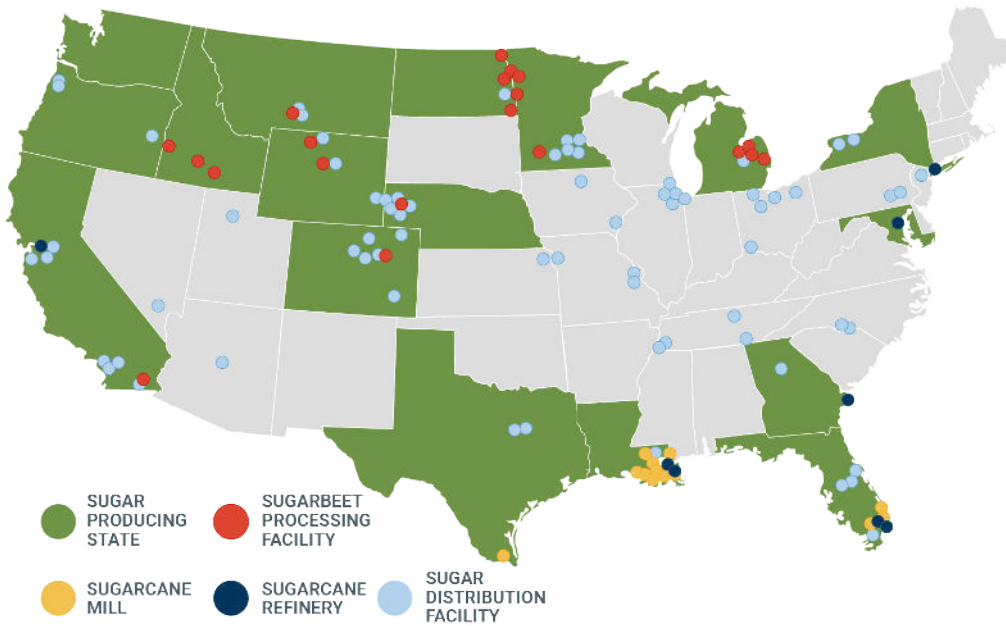

Our sugar is made from sugarbeets and sugarcane. Rooted in our communities, some of our multi-generational family farms date back to the early 1800s. 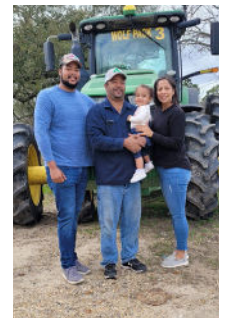
SUGARCANE: Sugarcane is a perennial grass that is taller than a basketball goal when harvested each year. Its root system remains in the ground for 3-5 years.



SUGARBEET: Sugarbeets are a root crop that is white, not red, and can weigh 3-5 pounds at harvest. This crop is planted and harvested annually.

Family Farmers And Workers Make A Substantial Impact

- Our sugar companies are farmer-owned cooperatives, employee-owned, or family-owned businesses that contribute **\$23.3 billion annually to the U.S. economy.**
- Our industry operates a network of **90 domestic sugar factories, mills, refineries, and storage facilities** that directly serve American manufacturers and consumers.
- Our industry is **at the heart of the communities** where we live and work. In both rural and urban areas, the sugar industry provides jobs, contributes to local charities, and supports educational opportunities that strengthen the social well-being of our neighborhoods.
- Our **workers benefit from well-paying jobs**, upward mobility, and investments in workforce development. Many of the industry's facilities utilize union labor.

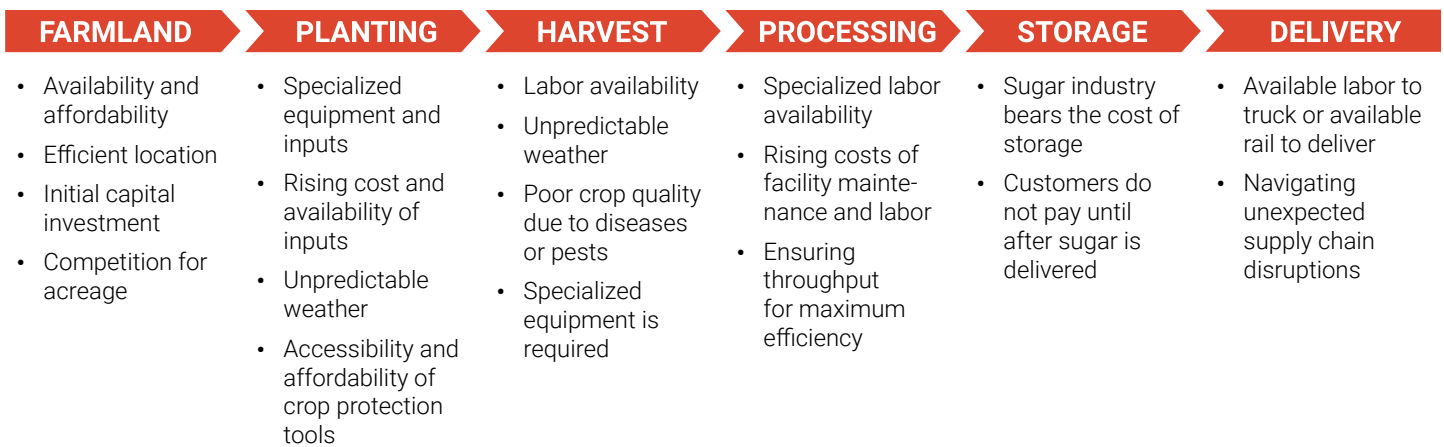
Made In America



America is one of the world's largest producers of sugar. Our farmers are highly innovative and efficient, supplying around 70 percent of our domestic sugar needs from sugarbeet and sugarcane crops.

- Annually, the industry produces the equivalent of about **4.5 billion 4-lb bags of sugar.**
- A strong domestic supply of sugar ensures that consumers and food companies are **less dependent on imports** of heavily subsidized foreign sugar.
- Our forward-looking infrastructure investments – from **just-in-time delivery** to strategically located refineries and storage facilities – mean our customers can count on a reliable supply of sugar.

Sustainably Made in America

America's sugar producers have dedicated decades to investing in and championing sustainability. Protecting the air, land, and water is a profound commitment and passion for our farmers and workers.

- Investments in new research, technologies, and techniques have boosted efficiency and sustainability on our farms and in our factories.
- Our farmers produce 14% more sugar on 8% less land than 20 years ago.
- On average, yields have increased 23% per acre while using less water, less energy, and fewer agricultural chemicals.

Innovative Byproducts

Beet & cane molasses and pulp are used in animal feed.

Sugarcane biomass is used to produce electricity and eco-friendly kitchenware.

Sugarbeet juice can be used for runway and road deicer.
